This plenary wishes to introduce the Peoples' Forum, its aims and stakes. Besides European environmental activists and NGOs specialized in finance, more than ten delegates from occupied and global south territories resisting extractivism and fossil expansion will quickly sketch their struggles, showing the common points that brought them together as well as the peculiarities of each of their fights.

<u>11:30am – Plenary 2 - Framing the big picture : from fossil extractivism to fossil finance,</u> a neocolonial system of capital accumulation

The panel gives an overview of the multifaceted problems we're tackling, namely climate chaos, the destruction of the commons, environmental and social impacts, violence against communities and environmental defenders, state corruption, energy dependence and precarization - issues that are all linked to the fossil industry. The idea is to make the key connection between all such aspects and the way they are lived day to

day in different regions of the world, to then draw the broader picture of fossil finance. This means both understanding the architecture of today's financial system and tracing its deep roots in the colonial past and present of fossil extractivism.

The general idea of this first co-creation space is getting to know the different ways we already have of tackling this common problem in specific cases, for example through disinvestment campaigns, shareholder advocacy, territorial defense, etc., and working towards building alliances to tackle new specific cases together in the future (i.e. joint campaigns against the financial flows behind one company or one specific project).

Workshop 1 - Crisis, extractivism and migration. Structural reasons for migration
Dario Farcy

How spiraling debt in Latin America deepens extractivist projects, motivating migration to the global north. This research is the result of years of political activism and migrant organizing. We want its result to be useful for the groups of migrants in the global North. By presenting the progress of the work, carried out by activists from Argentina, Bolivia and Germany, we want to discuss the usefulness of our perspective with other groups and organizations. Doing so when the document is not yet finished will help us to incorporate other perspectives and make the final work more useful.

• Workshop 2 - Fossil Capital - Simon Schaupp

What role do fossil fuels play in capitalism? This workshop introduces the basic categories of a Marxian analysis of capitalism. Then it outlines how fossil fuels were essential in the historical development of capitalism. They are not just ressources - like wood or cotton - out of which commodities are produced but rather the motor of all commodity production. However, this centrality to the whole economy also made them an important power lever for the workers' movement, which it used to assert basic democratic rights and welfare. This intricate connection of fossil fuels with the institutions of modernity poses a challenge to the climate movement, which we will discuss in terms of its strategic implications. The workshop will consist of two parts: First an introductory talk and then a discussion on the practical implications of the theory of fossil capitalism.

The panel underpins the undemocratic and colonial character of our current financial international institutions, pointing out the importance of addressing finance regulation as a strategic approach to advance towards climate, environmental and social justice. This entails first and foremost understanding how financial regulation could be both different and complementary to other existing international campaigns and or judicial mechanisms working towards the respect of nature, life and human rights.

The co-creation break out sessions take place in small groups working parallel to each other. The general idea of this second co-creation moment is finding ways of addressing collectively, with a systematic approach, the question of fossil finance regulation. Organizations and movements will discuss how to collaborate through different strategies and fronts to move towards environmental and social justice not only with the aim of cutting specific fossil finance flows and stopping individual fossil extractivist projects, but also that of addressing the issues in a systematic way.

In this workshop we will explore the connections between debt, extractivism and the climate/environmental/planetary crises. We will discuss how we can create resilience and build power from the bottom-up to end financial colonialism by connecting grassroots activists from the Global South & North, and bringing together workers, indigenous, feminists, climate and frontline environmental movements. A part of this is brainstorming concrete collaborations that can bridge Global South frontline struggles with Global North activists & diaspora, and strategize ways to continue empowering one another. We will discuss how debt, along with the austerity policies imposed by Global North multilateral institutions such as the IMF and World Bank, is driving poverty and is one of the causes of forced migration.

Workshop 7: Enforcing Climate Justice: The Imperative of strong binding regulations on Transnational Corporations for a Just Transition - Juliana & Rafaele (Global Campaign to Reclaim People's Sovereignty, Dismantle Corporate Power and Stop Impunity)

The unleashed power and greed of Transnational Corporations (TNCs) is responsible for consistent and systematic violations of human rights worldwide. Moreover, TNCs are responsible for about 70% of the global GHG emissions, on the side of

water and soil pollution, desertification processes and deforestation. However, impunity reigns, as there is a huge legal gap within international law that allows TNCs to evade responsibility by jumping borders. After more than 40 years of voluntary frameworks hoping to regulate TNCs, the climate emergency has also brought the urgent need for binding regulations for TNCS. This workshop will draw upon this necessary connection between the anti-corporate and the climate justice movements to build alliances and design strategies for common action. By presenting the history of the UN process of the Binding Treaty, the current state of play of the negotiations and its challenges, we will show how this binding instrument will constitute a major legal and political leverage for movements and organizations fighting for climate and social justice against the corporate-led neoliberal globalization.

In this round-table we try to start from the struggle experiences related to water and land defense against extractivist projects, to ask the question of how to assure the subsistence of the concerned communities. Environmental and social defenders from different parts of the world will share the way they have organized to create concrete economical alternatives for local communities, inventing cooperative systems and networks of solidarity, fundamentally different from the development policies that come with international markets and structures of government. This opens up the question of the possibility of international cooperation to support and extend these community-based economic models.
